

Crime Prevention


April included 41 hours of community immersion with an education-heavy schedule focused on internet safety and awareness for our elementary school students. These lessons emphasized preventative measures both parents and students can take to ensure their internet experience is fun and educational but also safe. With students about to leave for summer vacation, bike and traffic safety lessons for elementary students provided best practices and ideas of how to be safer on their bikes and scooters while enjoying their time outside during the break.

The neighborhoods of Laurelbrooke and Bridgemore held Neighborhood Watch meetings and established their own expectations and hopes for the program in the coming months. The Williamson County Crime Stoppers held a monthly meeting, discussing new developments in ongoing tips as well as assisting with items for the upcoming Williamson County Fair. Winstead Elementary hosted a student breakfast on the 19th, which allowed students to spend time with the SROs while also seeing a WCSO helicopter land and take off. Students were able to ask both the pilots and deputies questions about the profession. Lastly, Clearview Baptist Preschool hosted a Touch-a-Truck event on 16th. This event allowed preschool children to see several first responder vehicles and interact with local first responders including two of the WCSO's new K-9s.


